



A Festival of City, Art, and Future *Roppongi Art Night 2025 to be held*

Date : September 26 (Fri) – 28 (Sun)

Featuring 30 artists in 50+ programs, and “RAN Focus” on Republic of Korea this year.
Three days immersed in creative energy, where diverse cultures and arts intersect.

The Roppongi Art Night Executive Committee will hold *Roppongi Art Night 2025*, an art festival set in the streets of Roppongi, for three days from Friday, September 26 to Sunday, September 28, 2025. With the theme of “A Festival of City, Art, and Future,” the entire city of Roppongi will once again be immersed in creative energy.



Since its inception in 2009, this event has continued to evolve with each passing year, with this year marking its 14th edition*. Among the program highlights is “RAN Focus”, which launched last year. This program showcases a specific country or region by highlighting works by prominent artists from the location. This year’s focus is on Republic of Korea, featuring a diverse lineup of six outstanding artists, including Ayoung Kim, a video artist who earned a good reputation at the *MACHINE LOVE: Video Games, AI, and Contemporary Art* exhibition held at the Mori Art Museum, and Jibin Im, an artist who creates joyful installations of his signature “Bear Balloons” in urban settings.

Additionally, all across Roppongi—including museums, cultural facilities, large-scale complexes, and shopping districts—the festival will feature over 50 programs by approximately 30 artists, encompassing installation, performance, music, video, talk event, and digital art. Over these three special days, exploring the streets will become an artistic experience.

This event embraces shifts in the times and changes in shared values, challenging society to consider the potential of art to bring new insights and inspiration. Enjoy a moment of art in the autumn streets of Roppongi, filled with encounters and discoveries that stimulate the senses.

In the midst of the uncertain world, imagine the city, art, and future!

This year, *Roppongi Art Night 2025* will be held from Friday, September 26 through Sunday, September 28, presenting over 50 programs by approximately 30 artists and including installations and performances. Last year marked the launch of **RAN Focus**, which this year will showcase Republic of Korea in commemoration of 60 years of diplomatic relations with Japan! Republic of Korea is a world leader in the IT and entertainment industries, and many of its artists are making remarkable achievements on the international stage.

At this year’s Roppongi Art Night, **Ayoung Kim**’s *Delivery Dancer’s Ark: 0° Receiver* (2024), which earned a good reputation at the Mori Art Museum’s *MACHINE LOVE* exhibition and she won the 2025 LG Guggenheim Prize, will be screened on a giant LED screen approximately 13 meters wide at Roppongi Hills Arena. The work explores themes such as labor, technology, and identity in contemporary digital society through futuristic visuals. Additionally, **Jaewon Kang**’s sculpture, created with 3D software and inflatable materials, offers a visually stimulating experience by evoking the image of a spaceship from the future. In addition, **TAGO**, whose dynamic performances blend traditional Korean music (gugak) with modern elements, will also make an appearance. The festival will also feature a variety of colorful and joyful artworks created through a mix of techniques and materials, including balloons, traditional crafts, fabric, washi paper, and neon. As you experience these works throughout the streets of Roppongi, you’ll be in awe of their compelling meanings.

Ayoun Kim

Born in 1979, Seoul-based artist Ayoun Kim utilizes a mix of CGI, live-action footage and video game engines to tell stories referred to as “speculative fiction.” It fuses geopolitics, mythology, technology, and futuristic iconography, with the artist commenting on present society through the speculative future. Kim won the Golden Nica in the New Animation Art category at Prix Ars Electronica in 2023, and the LG Guggenheim Award at Guggenheim Museum in 2025.

Jaewon Kang

Born in 1989, Jaewon Kang is a Seoul-based artist and sculptor. He creates works using 3D programs and his tablet rather than traditional tools like a carving knife. As demonstrated by his works involving inflated and other materials, Kang is fascinated by sculptures that exist beyond traditionally defined physical matter. He explores them as ever-evolving forms that can exist across various planes and sizes. He has exhibited his works in various museums and galleries, including the Ho-Am Art Museum in Korea and Korean Cultural Center in Poland.

Jibin Im

Born 1984 in Busan, Jibin Im made his debut in 2009 at the Animamix Biennial held at the Shanghai Museum of Contemporary Art. Since then, he has been based in Seoul. He began his public art project EVERYWHERE in Seoul in 2011 and has gone on to exhibit in more than 50 cities in Asia, North America, Europe, and the Middle East, exploring new possibilities for urban public art. He continues to expand the social capacity of art through collaborations with numerous museums such as the Seoul Museum of Art, Daegu Museum of Art, and Abu Dhabi Manarat Al Saadiyat Museum; public institutions including UNESCO, the United Nations Foundation, UNICEF, and the 2018 Pyeongchang Winter Olympics and Special Olympics; and diverse global brands such as Gucci, Coca-Cola, Nike, and Samsung.

Young Sup Jin

Born 1958 in Busan, Young Sup Jin graduated from Kyungsung University Graduate School with a major in metal crafts. He has held numerous solo exhibitions in locations including Busan, Seoul, Kobe, and Fukuoka. From 2009 to 2018, he ran the creative artist residence space Art Factory in Dadaepo and organized community art activities in Busan’s Gamcheon Culture Village to further the social participation of art. Additionally, he has served as artistic director for the Hainan Haikou Art Project in China and the Kuroshio Art Project on Tanegashima Island (2011–2023).

TAGO

TAGO means lighting up the world by beating drums. Young Korean percussion group dedicated to sharing the wonders of Korean culture with the world through powerful and creative performances. A dynamic blend of traditional Korean instruments — from gigantic drums to small percussions — infused with elements of martial arts. In 2015, TAGO was designated as a Seoul professional art organization. In 2016–2017, they received 5-star reviews at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe. In 2017, they were invited to perform at the world-renowned music festival WOMAD. Between 2018 and 2025, TAGO actively toured across Europe, South America, and North America.

The concept of “Delivery Art” involves guerrilla-style installations of art at familiar street corners and public spaces that transform those locations into temporary museums. Jibin Im's signature project *EVERYWHERE* takes on this format by inserting the inflatable sculpture Bear Balloon into urban locations, creating an exhibition format where viewers naturally happen upon the artwork in their daily lives. Im breaks the mold of our intense daily routines by interrupting these familiar locations with playful characters that bring us small moments of comfort and laughter. This performance will bring Bear Balloon to multiple locations throughout the city.

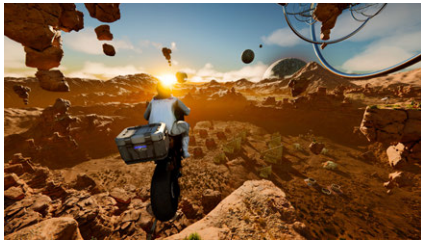

Delivery Dancer's Arc: 0° Receiver (2024), one of two sequels to Kim's *Delivery Dancer's Sphere* (2022), follows the multi-dimensional journey of young female courier drivers in a techno-futuristic Seoul—and beyond. No longer ordinary couriers, Ernst Mo and En Storm now transport something far more abstract and fundamental: “time” itself. As they traverse various calendar systems and astronomical technologies, they become entangled in networks of space and time that contradict and collide with one another.

The series of works, such as *Exo2_crop_xl* (2022), features sculptures that were digitally generated and then physically recreated by the artist. They may appear sturdy due to their metallic look, but are actually made of balloons, making them hollow, that deform once the air leaks out when the air blower is unplugged. With these works, Kang explores the future of sculpture, noting that with the advancement of digital technologies, sculptures that once existed only as physical objects now have the potential to evolve into various sizes and media.

This ink painting measures over 10 meters long on a single sheet of Japanese washi paper, transcending the usual notion of handmade washi. Kawahara can integrate any material into washi, and for this work, he has transformed an electronic circuit board into washi and rendered the back of the moon in ink. This is a radically new approach to traditional Japanese craft. This new ink painting, over 10 meters long, is a must-see.

Prism-Aureola is a large-scale sculpture exploring the moments of interaction between people and nature in everyday life. Through motifs such as clouds, rain, and rainbows, the work perceives the sky's ever-changing visuals as "embodiments of time," reconstructing the forces of gravity and the phenomena that fall from the heavens to the earth in sculptural form. Ono states, "We are surrounded by many beautiful things in our day-to-day lives. I hope this work sparks more chances to notice the things around us, without becoming greedy, and to truly observe these phenomena."

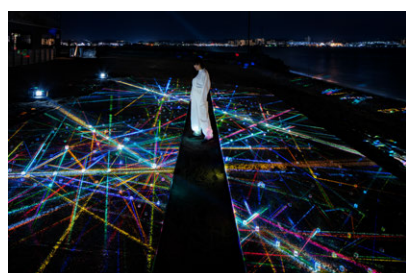

Originally trained as a civil engineer in Indonesia, Ari Bayuaji later moved to Montreal, Canada to pursue studying fine art. In 2020, during COVID-19 travel/movement restrictions, he launched the community-based art project *Weaving the Ocean* after discovering mangrove roots along Bali's coastline entangled with masses of plastic rope. Collaborating with traditional craft weavers, the project upcycles discarded fishing ropes and nets into vibrant nylon threads, transforming them into delicate, beautiful textiles. This initiative has evolved into a sustainable source of income and education for the community. Here, we present Bayuaji's diverse expressions where nature, tradition, and sustainability intersect.

In the early 1980s, the *Takenoko-zoku* emerged briefly in Harajuku, Tokyo. Dressed vividly, these youths danced spontaneously in pedestrian zones, leaving a striking yet fleeting impression before vanishing. Here, the artist reconstructs this ephemeral culture—one never personally experienced—using generative AI trained solely on Western datasets, creating music and visuals that never existed, evoking nostalgia and questioning the transient nature of youth and fashion.

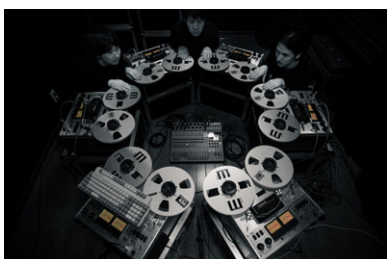

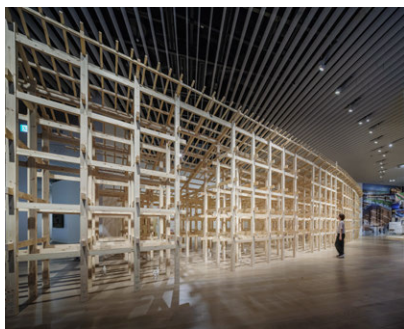

The Architecture of Sou Fujimoto: Primordial Future Forest

This exhibition is the first major exhibition for Sou Fujimoto, designer of *The Grand Ring* for Expo 2025 Osaka, Kansai, Japan. It provides a comprehensive overview in eight sections, covering everything from work in his early years to projects currently underway, and following his architectural journey over the past thirty years, the features of his architecture, and the philosophy behind it. It takes advantage of the venue’s expertise as a contemporary art museum, allowing anyone, not just people involved in architecture, to physically experience the essence of Fujimoto’s oeuvre by including exhibits such as installations and large-scale models that provide a spatial experience, as well as a mock-up. These complement conventional exhibits like scale models, plans, and photos of completed projects.

MAM Project 033: Christine Sun Kim

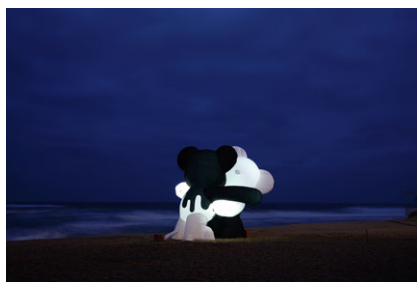

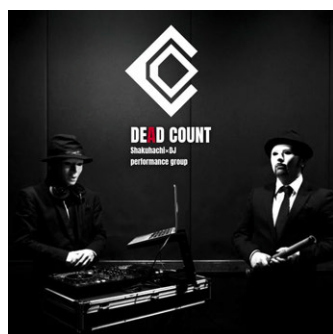

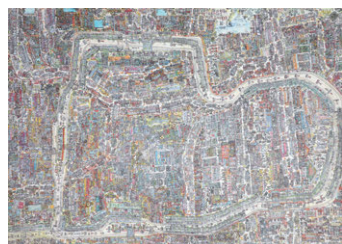

Ekin: A Genius Painter from Tosa at the End of the Edo Period

The Tōsa painter Kinzō (1812–1876), who left behind many folding screens depicting scenes from kabuki plays during the late Edo and Meiji periods, was affectionately known as “Ekin-san” in his hometown of Kōchi. Ekin’s folding screens are still displayed at shrines and other locations throughout Kōchi during summer festivals, and when illuminated by candlelight in the darkness, they leave a vivid impression on viewers. This exhibition marks the first large-scale retrospective of Ekin’s work at any Tokyo museum. Enjoy the works of Ekin, whose style stands out among his contemporaries.

IT'S A PEACE OF CAKE is a coined idiom that replaces the word “Piece” with “Peace.” At a night market in Taiwan, the sight of conflicting symbols such as guns and doves impressed into doll pancakes and coexisting in the same bag served as a stark reminder of the structure of modern society, where we consume such contradictions unconsciously. Using edible ingredients and inflatable objects—media of vastly different scales—to visualize the process by which our bodies absorb thoughts and desires, this experience prompts a renewed focus on the complexity and fragility of the world.

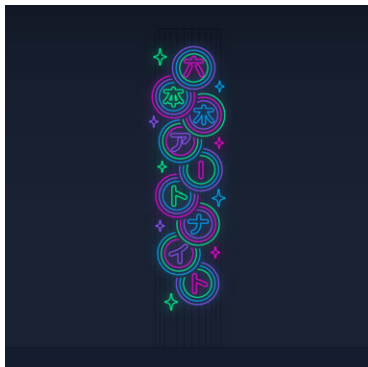
