

# Leading Project Gets Underway ahead of the "Cultural Programme" for the 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games in Tokyo

Arts Council Tokyo develops a variety of programs to encourage the creation and dissemination of arts and culture and to promote Tokyo as an international city of artistic and cultural attractions.

Starting this year, one of our key programs will be the large-scale Leading Project, which Arts Council Tokyo is undertaking in partnership with the Tokyo Metropolitan Government. **Utilizing a diverse array of human and cultural resources, the Leading Project will serve as the lead-in to the "Cultural Programme" of the 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games in Tokyo.** 

### ■ The "Cultural Programme" of the Olympic and Paralympic Games

While the Olympic and Paralympic Games are a festival of sport, they are also a cultural festival. The Olympic Charter of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) contains a provision concerning the "Cultural Programme", which states, "The OCOG (Organising Committee for the Olympic Games) shall organise a programme of cultural events which must cover at least the entire period during which the Olympic Village is open. Such programme shall be submitted to the IOC Executive Board for its prior approval." (Chapter 5, Rule 39)\* In the case of the Tokyo Games, this program will be held before the sporting contests, **over the four years from the end of the Rio Games in 2016 through 2020**.

The Leading Project will be launched as the Tokyo Metropolitan Government's model program for the "Cultural Programme".

# 1. Tokyo Caravan

Devised by playwright, director, and actor Hideki Noda, this new movement aims to gather together the diverse artistic scenes of Tokyo and the rest of Japan, in order to spread the word about them. Featuring contributions from a variety of artists assembled by Noda and his partners in this initiative such as, sculptor Kohei Nawa and contemporary artist Katsuhiko Hibino. Tokyo Caravan will start out from Rio de Janeiro during the 2016 Summer Olympics before popping up in various locations both within Japan and overseas to present a "Grand Cultural Circus," while continuously endeavoring to promote exchange that transcends the boundaries between countries and regions.

This year, as part of the Leading Project ahead of the "Cultural Programme" for the 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games in Tokyo, the general public will have the chance to see how the process of producing performances actually works.

### Message from the General Supervisor, Hideki Noda

Perhaps you could call Tokyo Caravan an "art brigade" or "cultural circus" that pops up unexpectedly in your town to present a spectacle. Anyways, it's an art caravan like nobody's ever tried before.

From October 8 to 10, we'll hold a workshop as a kind of experimental presentation, where people can see what we're working on while we're in the middle of it.

We'd also like to get people's feedback so we can work out how the project should evolve as we go forward. Then we plan to get underway in full swing next autumn.

I hope that the 2020 Tokyo Olympics will further transform TOKYO into a city of culture, and that our "art brigade/cultural circus" will survive beyond 2020 as part of its legacy. That's my vision for Tokyo Caravan.

In terms of the content of this Tokyo Caravan workshop...well, it's something suitable for a brigade, taking as its starting point the concept behind Tokyo Caravan – that "culture is traffic" – and featuring the motifs of exchange, travel, and transport.

Artists who support the intentions behind Tokyo Caravan will create everything.

The places where Tokyo Caravan will appear and the programs that it will feature will differ each time, and my dream is that they'll gradually get bigger and more ambitious in scope.

## 2. TURN

TURN is an art program that will bring people of different backgrounds together, generating a variety of uniquely individual encounters and artistic expressions.

This year, the first time that the event is taking place, we will aim to create programs in which the general public – including people who need welfare-related support – can participate, incorporating a blend of figurative and physical forms of expression and dialogue on the subject of diversity. Specifically, we will hold the 1st TURN Festival, which will feature programs that facilitate interaction between artists and social welfare facilities.

In the second year (FY2016), we will launch a model project in the form of the TURN Center, a venue for year-round exchange among a diverse array of people through the medium of art. Furthermore, we plan to hold the 2nd TURN Festival, which will showcase the fruits of these activities.
