Over 40 programs with 30 participating artist groups.

The Roppongi Art Night Executive Committee will hold *Roppongi Art Night 2024* for three days from September 27 (Fri) – 29 (Sun), 2024, set throughout the city of Roppongi with the theme of “A Festival of City, Art, and Future.”



This marks the 13th※ edition of the event since its inception in 2009, which will also see the debut of new initiatives *RAN Picks* and *RAN Focus*. *RAN Picks* is a program in which Roppongi Art Night will select several notable artists of interest and exhibit their works. *RAN Focus* will showcase a specific country or region by presenting programs by artists who are active in that location. This year's *RAN Focus* will close in on artists from Taiwan.

In addition, some artists who have participated in past editions of Roppongi Art Night will be exhibiting their works again in several programs. As in previous years, the entire Roppongi area, with its many art museums and other cultural facilities, large complexes, and shopping districts, will be the site for approximately 40 programs by about 30 artist groups, including installations, performances, music, videos, talk programs, and digital works.

As times change and values evolve, the festival continues presenting new ways to enjoy art while communicating its further possibilities within society. This fall, enjoy *Roppongi Art Night 2024*, where diverse cultures and creativity intersect.

Roppongi Art Night, an art festival held in the town of Roppongi, will be held this year in September. With the COVID-19 pandemic and resulting changes in lifestyle and societal values, this year's *Roppongi Art Night*, the 13th in the series, will try new frameworks and series, with an eye towards sustainability and continuation into the next generation. A concept that has been ingrained since its inception will be reiterated through the overarching theme of “A Festival of City, Art and Future,” with *Roppongi Art Night* evolving as a fresh, more global nighttime event.

While the past model for the event highlighted a main featured artist or artists, this year will shift to a new model of featuring artists through *RAN Picks*, exhibiting six groups of domestic and international artists who will be showcased in *Roppongi Art Night* at various locations, including Roppongi Hills, The National Art Center, Tokyo, and Tokyo Midtown. In addition, the new *RAN Focus* program has been established for each event to spotlight art from various countries and regions. This year, the focus will be on art from Taiwan. In addition, the program will be enhanced with opening performances, talk programs, encore returns of popular works from past *Roppongi Art Night* events, and community projects in which local residents can participate. Please look forward to *Roppongi Art Night 2024*.

Founded in 2010 by Ho Hsiao-Mei (b. 1963 in Taiwan), MeimageDance is recognized by their powerful visual presentation and usage of cultural style as seen in *renaissance of its ashes* (2019) and *New Paradise of Silent Island* (2017). 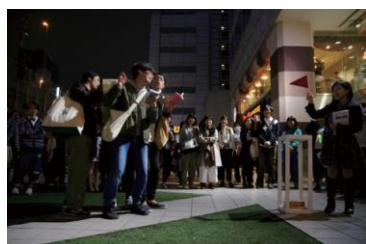

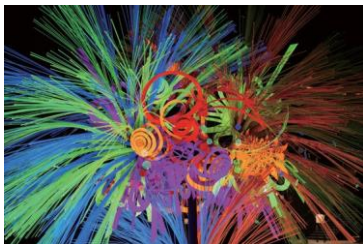

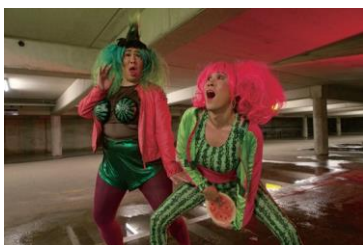

I have been to hell and back. And let me tell you, it was wonderful.

This is the first major solo exhibition in Japan in 27 years by Louise Bourgeois, the artist well-known for *Maman*, the giant spider sculpture that symbolizes Roppongi Hills. The exhibition introduces her career spanning over 70 years through approximately 100 works including sculpture, painting, drawing, and installation. About half of the works are being exhibited in Japan for the first time.

Pu Chen, a Taiwanese artist, distinctively observes the forms of living creatures, draws imagined forms by hand, converts them into virtual 3D data, and eventually develops them into various works such as animation, augmented and mixed reality (AR and MR), and sometimes physical sculptures. This work is the sculpture of his original character "Mossmo," which delivers the balance and connection between city, nature and ecology. The blue creature seated in front of the bamboo grove is a fox made from windbreak nets and wire mesh, which are commonly used to protect fields from being damaged by animals and to cover building construction sites. In the Roppongi area of Minato-ku, there are place names such as "Kitsune-zaka" and "Mamiana-cho," which are associated with the legends of foxes and raccoons, and there are many Inari shrines with foxes as their deities. This blue fox standing in the midst of an urban population reminds us of the existence of the wild animals that are disappearing in man-made spaces, and offers a form of prayer born from the relationship between animals and humans.

Fossils of shelves

Minoru Takahashi *everyday tactics 2024*

Tama Art University TUB Collaborative Program

Long-term Exhibition Program

This work attempts to invert the mundane routine of “placing things on a shelf”.

By hanging a board diagonally on a shelf with the convenience of variable height, we make it into something that is not a shelf. The work rejects the usual use of shelves, and explores “interesting forms” that emerge when things lose their convenience and meaning.

The objects to be placed are created in an attempt to “imagine what would happen if the things around us were unearthed as fossils in the future”. “Interesting forms” are created by changing their shapes through weathering and being hit by rain, as well as through changes in people's knowledge and ideas over time.

Hanabusa Itchō: A Talented Man of Great Refinement Depicts the Floating World—In Commemoration of the 300th Anniversary of His Death

Hanabusa Itchō (1652-1724) was a painter who was active mainly in Edo during the Genroku era (1688-1704). Although initially trained academically under Kanō Tan'yū's younger brother, Yasunobu, he was inspired by Hishikawa Moronobu and Iwasa Matabei, producing his own unique genre paintings with vivid depictions of people of the city. In 1698, at the age of 47, he was exiled to Miyakejima Island, where he was known as "Island Itchō" for the highly regarded paintings he created during that time. This exhibition commemorates the 300th anniversary of Itchō's death and explores his painting career and fascinating personality through his signature works.

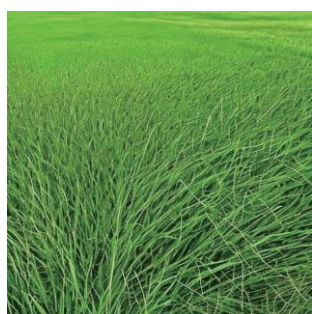

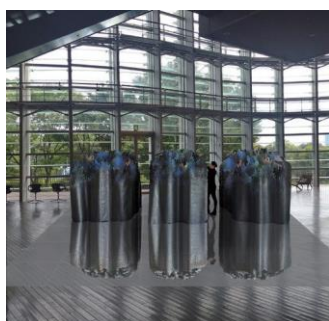
